

The screening kit will now be automatically posted to everyone over 50. Screening can detect early signs of bowel cancer, even before symptoms appear.

Awareness Month. Awareness Month.

A DVT (deep vein thrombosis) is more likely to happen if you:

- are over 60
- are overweight
- smoke
- have had DVT before
- take the contraceptive pill or HRT
- have cancer or heart failure
- have varicose veins

Endometriosis

A GP will ask about your symptoms and may ask to do:

- a physical examination (including an internal vaginal exam) – to check your tummy (abdomen) and your pelvic area
- blood tests

Give your GP as much information about your symptoms as you can.
